Registration Form for French Classes: Spring 2012

The AFLCR French instruction program emphasizes oral expression within the necessary boundaries of grammar, along with listening, reading and writing. Classes are taught by experienced instructors who are native and near-native French speakers.

Classes meet from 6:30 to 8:00 pm. Tuition for a 11-week course: \$225 (\$202.50 for current AFLCR members) due with registration form. This fee is non-refundable. For the first three levels, a textbook is provided for use during the session; if you wish to keep it, the cost is \$20. The Spoken French classes may require a text to be purchased if the instructor so chooses.

All classes are held in #304 Dupont Building, 123 Ethan Allen Avenue, on the north campus of Saint Michael's College (Fort Ethan Allen). See directions attached.

	<p>Beginning French A- <i>This introduction to French covers topics including greetings, telling time, the weather, numbers, dates and seasons, expressing possession, and likes and dislikes. Basic grammar instruction includes the verbs to be, to have, and verbs ending in -er as well as adjective agreement and definite and indefinite articles.</i> <i>Brenda Kaim, instructor, Wednesdays in Room 304 on 3/7, 3/14, 3/21, 3/28, 4/4, 4/11, 4/18, 5/2, 5/9, 5/16, 5/23</i></p>
	<p>Beginning French B. - <i>This course touches on topics such as family life and home-related terms, clothing and colors, and talking about the past. Grammar topics include the verbs to come and to go, regular -ir and -re verbs, and verbs for describing everyday activities, an introduction to past tenses, and question words.</i> <i>Alysse Anton, instructor. 	<p>Intermediate French A.- <i>Learn vocabulary and forms for talking about food and drink, learning, politics, city life, media, and law enforcement as well as terms for expressing quantity. Grammar topics include the verb to do and other common regular and irregular verbs, and more about expressing the past as well as direct and indirect object pronouns.</i> <i>Marjorie Marciano, instructor. Grammar topics include reflexive verbs, the future and conditional tenses, forming adverbs, the subjunctive mood, and using the pronouns y and en.</i> <i>Yves Compère, instructor. 	<p>Spoken French I: <i>For those who have a good grasp of Intermediate-level grammar and want to practice speaking. Directions and Map to AFLCR, 304 Dupont Building: From Burlington - On Rt. 15, past Saint Michael's College, the Fanny Allen Hospital etc., take the first entrance into the old Fort Ethan Allen which is on your left. Take the second right which is Ethan Allen Ave. Count the buildings on your left from that point. Dupont is the third building on the left. There is a sign in front that says "Ethan Allen Avenue Office Complex". The name "Dupont" is hidden by the rather large trees in front. These buildings have two entrances; one on the left and one on the right. If you find parking on the street in front, enter through the door on the right. Go upstairs; right at the top of the stairs and straight into the corridor by the Japan Society Office. Turn left and #304 will be on your right.

From Essex or points East, take the first entrance to the Fort on your right between the two brick markers. Bear left onto Dalton Drive and then stay fairly straight to go onto Ethan Allen Ave. Dupont is the second building on your right after the Elley Long Music Center.

If parking is not available on the street in front of the building, there is parking in back. Go into the parking for Elley-Long and continue to the next street, which is Hegeman Drive. Turn left and then left again in front of a one story ranch type white house. This will lead you around the rear of Dupont, on your left, with parking on the right. Use the rear entrance; go through the double doors and up the stairs as above.
